

# Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Young Leaders) (Thailand)

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION ON**

This information pertains to one of the JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Young Leaders) of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), which shall be implemented as part of the Official Development Assistance of the Government of Japan based on bilateral agreement between both Governments.

'JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (KCCP)' as a New Start

In the Development Cooperation Charter which was released from the Japanese Cabinet on February 2015, it is clearly pointed out that "In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spirit of jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field-oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together." We believe that this 'Knowledge Co-Creation Program' will serve as a center of mutual learning process.

# I. Concept

The "Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Young Leaders)" is conducted by JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency) under a technical cooperation scheme of the Government of Japan, with the purpose of promoting human resource development in developing countries.

Under the program, young leaders, who will become nation-building leaders in the future, are invited to Japan for 27 days with opportunities to:

- 1) develop their specialties through experiencing and learning technologies and skills in Japan, and
- 2) increase their willingness to resolve issues on their own.

Through this program, the participants are expected to:

- (1) gain broader perspectives on regional and community development;
- (2) learn some critical and concrete programs and roles of various stakeholders in regional development;





#### 8. Course Outline:

This program consists of the following components.

#### (1) Lectures regarding:

- a. Historical background of development in Hokkaido
- b. Roles, outcomes and challenges of comprehensive development planning in Hokkaido by various stakeholders after the World War Two (central government, local government, political parties, citizens and etc.)
- c. Sustainable development in a small town where regional challenges such as a falling birth rate and an aging population are being tackled
- d. Current socio-economic programs in Hokkaido (6<sup>th</sup> industries, inbound tourism promotion, bio-cluster development and the Ainu\* culture promotion)

#### (2) Observations by:

- a. the government and its related organizations
- b. Hokkaido Museum, University facilities, Agriculture and forestry related facilities
- (3) Discussions with officials, academics and citizens who are involved in Hokkaido's development.

## III. Conditions and Procedures for Application

#### 1. Nominee Qualifications:

Applying Organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

#### (1) Essential Qualifications

All applicants must:

- 1) Be nominated by the Government of the Thailand in line with the procedures mentioned in 3(1) below.
- 2) Have experience in the relevant field: be involved in a field corresponding to the course mentioned in *II. Description*.
- 3) Age: be from twenty (20) to thirty-five (35) years of age and be expected to become leaders in their specialized fields in the future.
- 4) Language: have a good command of spoken and written English which is equal to TOEFL iBT 77 or more (This program includes participation in discussions and presentations, which requires competence of English ability. Please attach an official certificate for English ability such as TOEFL, TOEIC etc, if possible)
- 5) Health: be in good health, both physically and mentally, to participate in the Program in Japan. Pregnant applicants are not recommended to apply due to the potential risk of health and life issues of mother and fetus.
- 6) Enthusiasm: have strong enthusiasm to build active local areas and improve quality of life for people in local areas.

#### (2) Recommendable Qualifications

- 1) Participants must not have made any previous visits to Japan
- 2) Educational Background: be a graduate of university

#### 2. Required Documents for Application

- (1) Application Form: The Application Form is available at the JICA office
- (2) Photocopy of passport: If you are securing a new passport during application, submit a photocopy of the old passport by the deadline set by JICA Thai. Permanent government employees must secure official passport once accepted into the program. However, during the application process, permanent government employees should submit a copy of their valid regular passport. \*Photocopy should include the following:

Name, Date of Birth, Nationality, Sex, Passport Number and Expiry Date.

- **(3) Job Report**: Job Report should be submitted with application form. Detailed information is provided in the ANNEX 1.
- (4) Self-Introduction Video: Self-Introduction Video should be submitted with

application form. Detailed information is provided in the ANNEX 1.

#### 3. Procedures for Application and Selection:

#### (1) Submission of the Application Documents:

The Government of Thailand will take the necessary measures to nominate appropriate applicants for the program, and will forward to the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan) one (1) copy of the specified Application Form for each applicant no later than <u>5:00 pm on Wednesday, May 8, 2019.</u>

#### (2) Selection:

After receiving the documents through proper channels from your government, the JICA office will conduct screenings, and then forward the documents to the JICA Center in Japan. Selection will be made by the JICA Center in consultation with concerned organizations in Japan. The applying organization with the best intention to utilize the opportunity of this program will be highly valued in the selection. Qualifications of applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military will be examined by the Government of Japan on a case-by-case basis, consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan, taking into consideration their duties, positions in the organization, and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner.

#### (3) Notice of Acceptance

Notification of results will be made by the JICA office **by May 20, 2019.** A separate acceptance letter shall likewise be sent to each of the nominating offices. Only accepted and alternate applicants will be notified of the result.

#### 4. Conditions for Attendance:

- (1) to strictly adhere to the program schedule.
- (2) not to change the program topics.
- (3) not to extend the period of stay in Japan.
- (4) not to be accompanied by family members during the program.
- (5) to return to home countries at the end of the program in accordance with the travel schedule designated by JICA.
- (6) to refrain from engaging in any political activities, or any form of employment for profit or gain.
- (7) to observe Japanese laws and ordinances. If there is any violation of said laws and ordinances, participants may be required to return part or all of the training expenditure depending on the severity of said violation.
- (8) to observe the rules and regulations of the accommodation and not to change the accommodation designated by JICA.


1) Participants can use an indoor swimming pool and gymnasium located next to JICA Hokkaido. The charges are paid by JICA.



#### For Your Reference

#### **JICA and Capacity Development**

The key concept underpinning JICA operations since its establishment in 1974 has been the conviction that "capacity development" is central to the socioeconomic development of any country, regardless of the specific operational scheme one may be undertaking, i.e. expert assignments, development projects, development study projects, training programs, JOCV programs, etc.

Within this wide range of programs, Training Programs have long occupied an important place in JICA operations. Conducted in Japan, they provide partner countries with opportunities to acquire practical knowledge accumulated in Japanese society. Participants dispatched by partner countries might find useful knowledge and re-create their own knowledge for enhancement of their own capacity or that of the organization and society to which they belong.

About 460 pre-organized programs cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs and are being customized to address the specific needs of different target organizations, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

#### Japanese Development Experience

Japan was the first non-Western country to successfully modernize its society and industrialize its economy. At the core of this process, which started more than 140 years ago, was the "adopt and adapt" concept by which a wide range of appropriate skills and knowledge have been imported from developed countries; these skills and knowledge have been adapted and/or improved using local skills, knowledge and initiatives. They finally became internalized in Japanese society to suit its local needs and conditions.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from this "adoption and adaptation" process, which, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories. We presume that such experiences, both successful and unsuccessful, will be useful to our partners who are trying to address the challenges currently faced by developing countries.

However, it is rather challenging to share with our partners this whole body of Japan's developmental experience. This difficulty has to do, in part, with the challenge of explaining a body of "tacit knowledge," a type of knowledge that cannot fully be expressed in words or numbers. Adding to this difficulty are the social and cultural systems of Japan that vastly differ from those of other Western industrialized countries, and hence still remain unfamiliar to many partner countries. Simply stated, coming to Japan might be one way of overcoming such a cultural gap.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit us, to mingle with the Japanese people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japanese systems, so that integration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objectives.
